PHONOLOGICAL AWARENESS

Phonological awareness is a broad term used for all things related to the sounds of spoken language. Phonological awareness is **entirely oral**, and forms the building blocks for later reading before print is even introduced. It is the ability to identify, think about, and manipulate sounds in spoken speech. Phonemic awareness and letter knowledge are the two best predictors of how well a child will learn to read during the first two years of school.

It can be helpful to think about moving children along a continuum of skills—from simplest to most complex. Blending

(child shows number of sounds on their fingers) "I am going to say a word pig. Tell me the sounds you hear in pig." Answer: /p//i//g/ Jump for each sound you hear in a word. Example Words: 2 sounds cow 3 sounds shark chick goat 4 sounds tiger snake
